# The Poor Clare Nun's Last Public Mass at the Monastery in Memphis

Memphis, TN — The Poor Clare Nuns held the last public mass on Sunday, Aug, 11 2019, at the Monastery of St Clare in Memphis.

The nuns will be leaving the building that has housed their order since 1932 in the Frayser neighborhood. Their numbers have dwindled down to four sisters.

In May of 2018 the Vatican issued guidelines that all contemplative communities should have at least seven members. The monastery will be closed at the end of the year.

## Called to Serve

This fall, Catholic men who feel called to serve as permanent deacons in the diocese will have the opportunity to attend information sessions to learn more about the diaconate formation process and submit applications for formation.

The Most Rev. David Talley endorsed the establishment of a new permanent diaconate formation cohort for the Catholic Diocese of Memphis last month. "Of the many gifts given to the People of God through the Second Vatican Council, one of those great gifts was the restoration of the Order of Deacons," Bishop Talley said. "In my experience in three different dioceses, the permanent diaconate exhibits servant leadership and an extraordinary fraternal love of the people of Christ's Church."

According to the U.S.
Conference of Catholic
Bishops, a deacon is an
ordained minister of the
Catholic Church. They are
called to serve the Church in
three distinct areas:

- Service to the word of God — Deacons proclaim the Gospel, preach and teach in the name of the Church.
- Service to the sacraments — Deacons can baptize infants, lead the faithful in prayer, witness marriages, conduct wake and funeral services and assist at the Eucharist.



 Service on behalf of justice, charity and peace —Deacons identify the needs of others and marshal the Church's resources to meet those needs. They serve as Christ's heralds of hope and love to the poor, disabled, needy, lonely, forgotten and outcasts of society. Through their living witness and service, they promote works of mercy, justice, reconciliation and peace.

According to Deacon Bill Davis, director of diaconate formation who will lead the diocese's seventh formation cohort, it's important for interested candidates to understand that the diaconate formation process is a lengthy one — it takes five years of study and reflection — and, upon ordination, it's a lifetime commitment of service to the Church.

"It's important for a man to discuss his intention with his family, including his wife," Deacon Davis said. "Everyone in the family must be on board and join together in the decision. You must learn to balance home life and service to the Church. When you make the commitment, you commit to service as a deacon for the rest of your life. . It's a commitment of service of which we are not paid. We are ordained to serve the Church and the bishop." Deacon Davis said that the diaconate formation team will interview candidates next spring. Upon selection by Bishop Talley, all candidates will begin a one-year

process called aspirancy,

which is the initial phase of diaconate formation when candidates discern the nature of God's calling. It's a time of self-discovery, strengthening of faith and ongoing learning, after which candidates make the decision to answer God's call. After aspirancy, candidates will commit to four years of college-level academic study, one weekend per month until ordination.

All candidates for diaconate ordination are required to be

- 35 years of age upon ordination.
- In full communion with the Church for two years. This includes all sacraments of initiation and holy matrimony.
- In a stable, spousal relationship for at least five years if candidate is married.
- A registered participating member of a parish in the diocese of ordination for at least two years.
- Involved in service to the community and Church.
- Capable of college-level academic study.

The Catholic Diocese of Memphis has 69 deacons who serve at various parishes throughout the diocese. The last diaconate formation cohort was ordained three years ago.



## Diocesan Priest, Rev. James L Pugh, Dies



Father James Lee Pugh died on Friday, August 9, 2019, at the age of 77.

A native of Nashville, Father Pugh was the son of Robert Lee Pugh and Pauline Farris Pugh.

He was a graduate of Father Ryan High School in Nashville, St. Bernard Seminary in Cullman, AL and St. Mary's Seminary in Roland Park, MD.

Ordained to the priesthood at the Cathedral of the Incarnation in Nashville on April 29, 1967, Father Pugh began his priestly service in West Tennessee and remained when the Diocese of Memphis was formed in 1971.

Father Pugh served as the Assistant (Associate) Pastor of the following parishes: Immaculate Conception, Memphis; St. William, Millington; St. Louis, Memphis; St. Therese, Memphis; and St. Paul the Apostle, Memphis. He later served as pastor of the following parishes: St. John, Memphis; Church of the Incarnation, Collierville; St. Francis of Assisi, Cordova; St. Anne (Highland), Memphis; St. Andrew the Apostle, Lexington and St. Regina, Parsons; and St. Paul the Apostle, Memphis.

Father Pugh taught for many years at the parish schools to which he was assigned as well as at Catholic High School for Boys and Christian Brothers High School.

Father retired from active ministry in 2012, though he continued to celebrate Mass at the Ave Maria Home where he was in residence.

Visitation for Father Pugh took place at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception on Tuesday, August 13, 2019, from 5:00pm-7:00pm. The Funeral Mass for Father Pugh was celebrated at the Cathedral on Wednesday, August 14, 2019, at 11:00am.

# Statement from the Bishops of TN on the Execution of Steve West



We, the bishops of the three dioceses in Tennessee in conjunction with the Catholic Public Policy Commission, clearly state our strong opposition to the state carrying out the death penalty today. Carrying out this execution does not serve the cause of justice and bucks the trend of states across the country moving away from the use of capital punishment.

Nationally, we have seen many people released from death row after they have been found to have been innocent of the crime for which they were convicted. Based on a human system as it is, there is always the chance that the state executes an innocent person. Even when guilt is certain, the execution is not necessary to protect society.

Pope Francis as well as St. John Paul II have called for the end to the death penalty as both cruel and unnecessary. It is simply not necessary as the only means to protect society while still providing a just punishment for those who break civil laws.

Rather than serving as a path to justice, the death penalty contributes to the growing disrespect for human life and continues a cycle of violence in society.

We pray for the victims of crime and their families and friends that they might find peace and healing in God's boundless love. We pray particularly for Wanda and Sheila Romines who Stephen Michael West was convicted of murdering. We pray for Mr. West that he, like all sinners, might find mercy in God's eternal judgment.

And, we pray for the people of Tennessee, that through our elected government, we might turn to the path that respects and defends human life from its beginning at conception to its end at a natural death.
