


TO BE A CHRISTIAN STEWARD

"As each one has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace." —1 Peter 4:10


What does it mean to be a Christian steward today? It is more than managing material goods or giving of time, talent, and treasure—though these remain essential. Christian stewardship is a way of life. It is our grateful response to God's generosity, rooted in discipleship and expressed in love. A Catholic steward receives God's gifts with gratitude, nurtures them with care, shares them joyfully and justly, and returns them with increase to the Lord.



Discipleship & Stewardship

To understand stewardship, we must first understand discipleship. As followers of Jesus, we are called to imitate Him in all things. This discipleship requires an intentional choice to follow Christ daily, no matter the cost. It calls for continual conversion of heart and a willingness to live not for ourselves, but for God and others.

Stewardship flows directly from this discipleship. A Christian steward recognizes that everything—life, abilities, time, relationships, faith, and material resources—is a gift from God. In response, we offer those gifts in love and service, following Christ's example. Stewardship shapes the way we live, pray, give, learn, work, and care for one another and the world around us.



Stewards of Time, Talent, and Treasure

At the heart of this way of life are three foundational gifts:

- ·Time, which we devote to prayer, family, presence, and mission;
- ·Talent, our unique abilities and charisms, used to serve the Church and community;
- ·Treasure, the material blessings entrusted to us, which we return generously to support God's work.

These gifts are meant to be used intentionally, faithfully, and joyfully—not just occasionally, but as part of the fabric of our daily lives.

Modern Catholic stewardship embraces all aspects of life and discipleship, including:



Prayer – Rooting our lives in conversation with God and the Sacraments



Service – Responding to needs within the Church and in the wider community



Hospitality – Creating a spirit of welcome, inclusion, and reverence for all



Creation – Caring for the Earth as stewards of God's handiwork



Vocation – Discovering and living out our unique calling in life



Formation – Growing in faith through study, reflection, and lifelong learning



Culture – Honoring the diversity of God's people through shared celebration and witness



Citizenship – Participating in public life with Gospel values and civic responsibility


These dimensions are not optional—they are invitations to come to the table and live our faith in action.
