Prayers of the Faithful

1. For the Universal Call to Holiness

• For all the baptized, that we may recognize our vocation to holiness and live as faithful disciples of Jesus in our families, parishes, and communities, we pray to the Lord.

2. For Families and Married Couples

• For married couples and families, that they may joyfully live their vocation of love and stewardship, nurturing one another in faith and witnessing God's love to the world, we pray to the Lord.

3. For Priests, Religious, and Consecrated Persons

• For priests, deacons, and all men and women in consecrated life, that they may be strengthened in their vocation and inspire others to give their lives generously in service to God's people, we pray to the Lord.

4. For Single Disciples and Young People

• For single men and women, especially the young, that they may discover their vocation in the Church and live it with courage, generosity, and joy, we pray to the Lord.

5. For Vocations in Daily Life

• For all people in their daily work and responsibilities, that they may see their labor and service as part of their vocation to build up the Body of Christ and care for God's creation, we pray to the Lord.

6. General Intentions

- That more men and women may courageously answer the call to priesthood, religious life, and lay ministry, we pray to the Lord.
- For young people discerning God's plan for their lives, that they may be open to His voice, we pray to the Lord.
- That families may be schools of faith where vocations are nurtured and supported, we pray
 to the Lord.

Pulpit Announcement

Announcement 1

This month, our parish is focusing on Stewardship of Vocation.

Each of us has a vocation — a unique call from God to live as His disciple. For some, that call is marriage and family life. For others, it is the single life, priesthood, or religious life. No matter our state in life, every vocation is a gift and a responsibility, meant to be lived generously for the good of the Church and the world.

Let us remember: when we live our vocations faithfully, our whole parish family is strengthened.

Announcement 2

Vocation is not only about priesthood or religious life — it is also about how we live our faith in family, work, school, and parish. When we share our gifts of time, talent, and treasure, we live out our vocation as faithful stewards.

Announcement 3

God calls each of us to holiness in daily life. As parents, students, workers, grandparents, or ministers, our vocation is lived in the ordinary moments when we choose love, service, and faithfulness. This is stewardship in action.

Announcement 4

The Church flourishes when each of us lives our vocation well — married, single, consecrated, or ordained. Stewardship of vocation is not only living our call, but also supporting and encouraging others in theirs. Let us pray for one another as we live out our vocations with joy.

Weekly Email Series

Week 1: What is Stewardship of Vocation?

Subject: God calls each of us by name

Body: Every person has a vocation — a call from God to live faithfully as a disciple of Jesus. Some are called to marriage, some to religious life or priesthood, some to live as single disciples, and all are called to holiness in daily life.

Stewardship of vocation means embracing this call with gratitude and living it generously for others. It is not only about "what we do" but "who we are" in **Christ.**

Reflection Question: How am I saying "yes" to my vocation right now?

Call to Action: Pray this week: "Lord, help me live my vocation with joy and generosity."

Week 2: Vocation in Family and Marriage

Subject: Our family, our first vocation

Body: For many, the first vocation is lived in family life — as husband or wife, parent or child. Marriage and family are schools of love, where we learn to give and receive as Christ gave Himself for the Church.

When we nurture one another in faith, forgive generously, and serve with love, we live stewardship of vocation right at home.

Reflection Question: How can my family serve God more faithfully this week?

Call to Action: Share a meal as a family and name one way each person lived their vocation today (as student, parent, spouse, sibling, friend).

Week 3: Living Vocation in Daily Life

Subject: Your work is holy

Body: Our vocation is not limited to Sundays or sacraments — it extends into every part of life. Whether you are a student, teacher, nurse, retiree, or business leader, God calls you to bring His love to your work and relationships.

Stewardship of vocation means seeing our daily responsibilities as opportunities to serve God and others.

Reflection Question: Where can I bring God's presence into my work, studies, or service this week?

Call to Action: Offer one concrete act of stewardship in your vocation — an extra kindness, patient listening, or a prayer for those you serve.

Week 4: Discerning and Encouraging Vocations

Subject: Supporting every vocation in the Church

Parents, teachers, mentors, and friends all share in the responsibility of helping one another discover God's call.

Reflection Question: Who in my life needs encouragement to live their vocation more fully?

Call to Action: Pray for vocations this week and encourage one person — a child, friend, or parishioner — in their unique call.

Parish Directions for Stewardship Commitment Cards

1. Primary Method – Online Submission

- Parishioners should be directed to complete their stewardship commitment card online through the diocesan website via the qr codes or website
- Please ensure your parish bulletin, announcements, and website/social media link directly to the diocesan stewardship commitment page.

2. Printed or Handwritten Cards

- If a parishioner completes a printed or handwritten commitment card, the parish should collect the card and promptly send it to the Diocese (Office of Development and Stewardship).
- Please do not retain cards at the parish for processing. Follow similar protocol for the Annual Appeal cards.

3. Diocesan Follow-Up

- Once received (online or printed), the Diocese will:
- Send a personalized follow-up to each individual with suggestions for how they can fulfill their commitment.
- Connect them with the appropriate diocesan office, parish ministry, or contact person related to their pledge.
- Provide links to relevant resources and websites to support their ongoing stewardship.

4. Parish Follow-Up

- The parish is encouraged to personally follow up with parishioners who have submitted commitments.
- A simple thank-you, personal contact, or invitation into the related ministry is an important part of building stewardship at the local level.
- Pastors and parish leaders should help ensure parishioners find opportunities within their own parish that align with their commitments.

Vocations Awareness Sunday

Invite a retired priest, seminarian, religious sister, or lay minister to speak after Mass about their vocation and how they discerned it.

• Parish Vocation Wall

Create a bulletin board that celebrates vocations: list parishioners in seminary or religious life, highlight married couples, and include Scripture on calling.

• Holy Hour for Vocations

Host an evening of Eucharistic Adoration dedicated to praying for vocations, with intercessions for youth, families, clergy, and discerners.

• "God Is Calling" Bulletin Series

Each week, print a short reflection on how Catholics can discern and live their vocation—whether married, single, religious, or ordained.

- Vocations Prayer Weekend: Include vocation-themed prayers of the faithful and bulletin inserts
- Sponsor a Seminarian: Invite families to spiritually "adopt" a seminarian
- Utilize the Dicoesan Office of Vocations as a resource
