

### A Guide to Stewardship of Hospitality

Hospitality is more than kindness—it is sacred discipleship. When we welcome others with love, attentiveness, and reverence, we welcome Christ Himself.

In the Gospels, Jesus frequently receives—and offers—hospitality. He dines with sinners, visits homes, blesses gatherings, and washes feet. He calls us to go and do likewise: to make space for the stranger, the seeker, the newcomer, and the forgotten.

Stewardship of hospitality means:

Time: pausing to see and engage others, especially those on the margins.

Talent: using your gifts of service, conversation, and presence to create belonging.

Treasure: offering resources and spaces that reflect God's welcome to all

Hospitality is not just a ministry—it's a way of life. A hospitable parish is a missionary parish, where people don't just attend—they belong.

#### **Best Practices**

- Offer simple hospitality in your home—invite neighbors, friends, parishioners, or those in need of connection. It doesn't need to be fancy. A cup of coffee and a listening ear can be sacred.
- Be approachable, kind, and attentive—not rushed or distracted.

- Using someone's name makes them feel seen and valued. If you forget—just ask again! It shows care and genuine connection.

## WELCOMING OTHERS: HOME AND PARISH CECKLIST

Hospitality is more than a smile—it's a disposition of the heart that says: "You belong here." Use this checklist to reflect on how you can live out stewardship through a spirit of welcome in your home, parish, and daily life.

In My Parish:
☐ I greet people before or after Mass, even if I don't know them.
☐ I smile and make room for others in my pew.
$\square$ I offer to help someone new find where to go (restroom, nursery, bulletin, etc.)
☐ I introduce myself to someone I don't recognize at parish events.
$\square$ I intentionally invite a new family or person to coffee hour or a parish ministry
☐ I look for ways my ministry or group can be more welcoming to newcomers.
☐ I pray that my parish community reflects Christ's love to everyone who walks in
In My Home or Daily Life:
☐ I make my home or table open to others—even in small, simple ways.
☐ I welcome visitors or neighbors with kindness and interest.
$\square$ I intentionally teach my children or family what it means to be welcoming.
☐ I offer encouragement, a smile, or a kind word to someone who looks lonely.
☐ I strive to listen attentively and without judgment when someone shares.
☐ I ask: "Who might feel left out—and how can I include them?"
Personal Reflection:
☐ Do I make space for others in my life the way Christ makes space for me?
☐ What keeps me from being more hospitable?
☐ What is one concrete step I can take this week to welcome someone new?
Prayer for a Welcoming Heart
Lord Jesus, You welcomed the stranger, the sinner, the poor, and the proud.
Open my heart to see You in every person I encounter.
Teach me to make room, to share joyfully, and to love generously.
